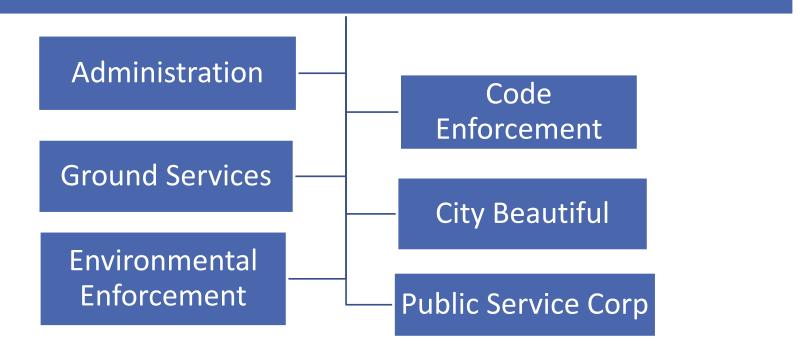

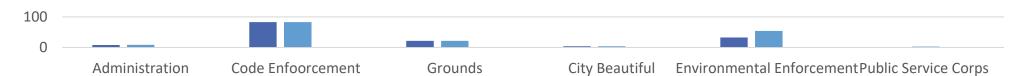
## FY26 Budget Org Chart at Legal Level: Community Enhancement – Medium

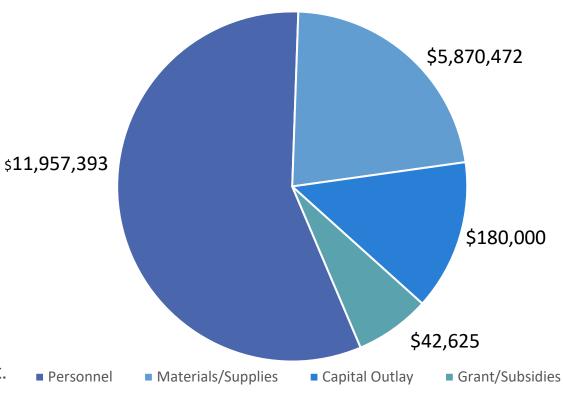
#### **Key Budget Priorities**

Community Enhancement will focus on implementing strategies to transform Memphis and impact issues related to blight including improving quality of life, public health and safety through efforts surrounding enforcement, remediation, and maintenance.

This strategy will be deployed City-wide, using geographic regions that have been identified using data driven analysis of multiple service request types including grass and weed overgrowth, abandoned, and dilapidated houses, scattered litter and debris, littered streets, clearing vacant lots, illegal dumping, discarded tires, and other exterior property violations. This will include residential and commercial properties distributed across all City Council Districts.

One major focus of the division will be increased programs and initiatives related to education and community engagement to ensure that citizens fully understand the importance their efforts play related to local ordinances that are in place to combat blight.

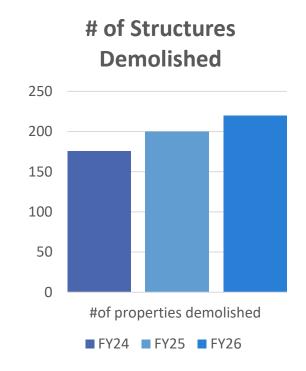

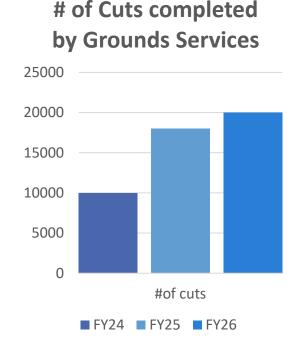

#### **Scope**

Comprehensive strategy to eradicate crime and blight along major corridors in the City. Community Enhancement will partner with Police, Fire and other City and County agencies to increase enforcement efforts related to vacant and blighted commercial businesses to foster and promote small business growth and development. The division will partner with MPD to seek chronic nuisance litigation related to long standing blighted commercial structures that are havens for crime, in order to transform these areas into well maintained thriving communities.

#### <u>Goals</u>

- Aggressive code enforcement efforts to prompt commercial property owners to come into compliance.
- Comprehensive blight mitigation to include addressing overgrowth, litter pickup, placing trash cans at intersections, and
  offering grants from Memphis City Beautiful to promote beautification projects.
- Educational campaign to include mailing correspondence from Environmental Enforcement to all business owners along the corridor to inform them of their responsibility to maintain the grounds of their property.
- Strategically identify possible opportunities for neighborhood redevelopment

## Proposed New or Budding Initiatives for FY26: Community Enhancement

#### **Administrative Hearing Process:**

When a property is found to be in violation of the Ordinance No. 5708, the International Property Maintenance Code, as amended for Memphis, Tennessee, and the responsible parties have been notified of the specific property violations and they have not come into compliance by a prescribed date, the case may be referred to, and owners may be notified to attend a scheduled administrative hearing.

Timeline: August 2025

**Expected Outcome**: Direct engagement with property owners to closely

monitor outcomes

Impact: Expected to relieve the case load of Environmental Court

### Proposed New or Budding Initiatives for FY26: Community Enhancement

- Implementation of Code Enforcement/Environmental Enforcement Fee Schedule
- Quarterly Inspection fees for vacant Commercial Structures
- Environmental Court fines/fees

Timeline: December 2025

**Expected Outcome**: Revenue Generating Opportunities

### **Challenges and Risks: Community Enhancement**

Budget reductions for Community Enhancement would impact the number of privately owned vacant lots that will be mitigated. We would need to return to the level of service that was being provided prior to the comprehensive blight initiatives/sweeps that were implemented in FY25.

Prior to the blight initiatives we were performing approximately 10,000 cuts per fiscal year. In FY25 we are on target to perform approximately 17,000 to 18,000 cuts. Also, we will not be able to perform commercial/multi family demolition projects, and the number of residential demolitions will be decreased to approximately 176, which was the average prior to the blight initiatives. In FY25 we are on track to complete over 250 demolitions if we were able to continue to support comprehensive, neighborhood-based blight initiatives.
